

Why is the Salt Marsh Important?

- Provides shoreline protection from erosion and storm surge, improves water quality
 - Absorb floods and wave energy, decreasing property damage by up to 20%
 - ➤ 1 acre can absorb up to 1.5 million gallons of floodwater
 - Average \$1.8million/km2 in protective value



Vision

The region's salt marshes and their migration corridors are conserved and protected into the future to the benefit of wildlife, coastal communities, and military through a collaborative, voluntary partnership.

Goal

Maintain, at a minimum, the current level of productivity and extent of the approximate one million acres of salt marsh within the South Atlantic states.



Guiding Principles

- Partnerships and Collaboration
- Involvement by Public and Private Sectors
- Strategic, Science-based Approach
- Conservation Plan as a Framework and Catalyst



What is needed to save this habitat?

Categories of protections:

- 1. Provide space for marsh to migrate
- 2. Remove/modify physical barriers that would prevent natural transition
- 3. Protect and restore salt marsh where it currently exists

Model: America's Longleaf Restoration Initiative

- Successful landscape scale conservation effort to protect 5 million acres from Virginia to Texas in 15 years
- Partnership between DoD, state and federal resource agencies, and many NGOs
- Plan development was led by partners, including the Southeast Regional Partnership for Planning and Sustainability (SERPPAS)




NC Marsh CAP (Conservation Action Plan)
