



Ensure NC Dept of Environmental Quality has adequate resources to carry out a long term Flood Resilience Blueprint program:

- Governor Cooper's recommended budget calls for SIX permanent DEQ position for Flood Resilience Blueprint
- NC House budget proposal supports the six positions (non recurring)
- A long term Blueprint program will allow for:
 - -Regular basin action strategy updates
 - -Grant/Contract admin for priority projects
 - -Capacity building assistance for local govts.

AFC Federal Policy & Government Relations Update





Our Federal Policy Vision provides a roadmap for an effective federal role in flood and adaptation policy

Fix federal data collection and communication

- Federal data drives trillions in investment and engineering decisions — yet it is routinely incomplete, inaccurate, and not up-to-date. This forces state and local governments to build for the future while blindfolded
- Fixing these data issues would impact trillions of dollars of investment, shift thousands of planning efforts for the better, and ensure infrastructure is built to last

Reform the post-disaster recovery process

- Post-disaster recovery programs
 disproportionately influence state and
 local efforts to recover and take on long term planning. Federal programs are
 slow, complex, and opaque, delaying
 short-term recovery and long-term
 planning
- Streamlining and strengthening these programs would shorten recovery timelines and truly transform our approach to disasters

Incentivize long-term and local state planning

- The federal government is not utilizing the resources at its disposal to properly incentivize and direct the type of longterm planning that will empower state and local governments to address their flood and disaster risk
- We need to help state and local governments to make accurate risk assessments and planning to help prioritize projects and drive longer-term policies



As Congress considered infrastructure policy, AFCA pushed for 12 priorities totaling \$38.2 billion to bolster flood resilience

Our approach to infrastructure

We saw this as a **once-in-a-generation opportunity** to secure investment in
infrastructure — not only through
dedicated resilience investments but also
through applying a resilience lens to all
infrastructure investments

We laid out 12 ambitious priorities to establish a marker for the investment we think is needed, recognizing that we likely would not achieve all of them, but we will set a strong foundation for what is needed

As the 2023 Farm Bill ramps up, we are focused on expanding policies that support flood adaptation and piloting innovative farming solutions

AFCA Farm bill priorities

Priority A Make USDA disaster assistance more responsive, so that communities have the resources and capabilities to recover swiftly after a disaster **Priority B Elevate flooding as a priority in USDA conservation** programs which enable producers to lead on innovative practices that reduce flooding **Priority C** Develop data at USDA to determine conservation practices' effect as a flood solution **Priority D** Strengthen USDA's Small Watershed Programs which enable communities to address flooding across

jurisdictional boundaries and at the watershed scale

Piloting local innovation



AFC has partnered with Northeast Iowo Resource Conservation & Development t measure the flood reduction impact of multi-cropping.



We are also pushing efforts to boost proactive state resilience and improve post-disaster recovery processes

U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development's Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) program

• Flexible, permanent authorization of CDBG-DR, which provides the bulk of long-term disaster recovery funding, would save money, expedite recoveries, and ease challenges among state and local recipients.

Championing Local Efforts to Advance Resilience (CLEAR) Act

 Bipartisan proposal that would fund state resilience offices, drive coordinated resilience planning, and other metric-driven activities.

Disaster Assistance Simplification Act and Disaster Survivors Fairness Act

 Senate and House bipartisan bills that would establish a universal disaster assistance application for disaster survivors to apply for federal assistance programs across various federal agencies. AFC has selected 6 communities for our Flood Resilient Communities Cohort, which we will walk through the federal infrastructure process to identify barriers to funding

- In collaboration with the American Public Health Association, this guide highlights six recommendations for community leaders to prepare for the dual disasters of flooding and COVID-19
- Many places face an overlap of COVID-19 and hurricane activity alongside long-term budget strain
- Local leaders are grappling with unique challenges, such as sheltering and evacuation during the pandemic
- Smaller, under-resourced communities are disproportionately affected by COVID-19 and flooding and could be left behind

- The main purpose of the guidebook is to help local leaders determine approaches to flooding or sea level rise that can work best for them
- Highlights 26 approaches broken down by cost, benefits, and implementation considerations
- Most of the case studies found in the guide are from communities with populations less than 50,000
