# Actions and activities that we are monitoring in Washington, D.C.

- FY25 funding for U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) is being developed via a workplan and is due next week
- FY26 Presidential "skinny" budget allocates less than the anticipated final amount for the USACE in the FY25 Continuing Resolution
- Awaiting hearings and confirmation of the Assistant Secretary of the Army for Civil Works
- FEMA Acting Administrator fired yesterday
- FEMA considering increasing threshold for major disaster declaration
- New nominee for Maritime Administration announced this week
- Recommendation to not allow federal funding for Category G projects
- Substantial cuts to multiple programs and federal agencies
- Reductions in workforce across the government
- Reconciliation and impoundment

### FY 25 Federal Funding Pots

Congress annually adds additional programmatic funding through Additional Dredging Needs Funding pots. The AIWW and IWW are eligible from funding through three of these line items. If included in the final appropriations bill, these funds will be allocated by USACE for additional dredging needs.

- General Navigation House: \$931.945 million, Senate: \$20 million
- Inland Waterways House: \$50 million, Senate: \$64.987 million
- Small, Remote & Subsistence Navigation House: \$90 million, Senate: \$329,178 million



# AIWW/IWW Needs Assessment 2025 Update


- WRRDA 2014 requires Corps of Engineers to quantify annual maintenance dredging needs of AIWW/IWW and provide report to Congress.
- 2025 estimate is \$56.5M to return to authorized width and depth (2016 estimate was \$126M). NC is \$15M.
- Annual Maintenance estimate is \$53M (2016 estimate was \$50.2M).
  NC is \$7M.
- Maintenance dredging projects conducted or planned in every state from VA to FL in 2025.

# North Carolina through the years






#### **FY26 AIWW INLET CROSSING MAINTENANCE DREDGING**



## Moving forward!

- Continue engagement on execution of appropriations for U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Support FY26 district amounts while pursuing Additional Dredging Needs funding pots. FY 25 Corps work plan later this month.
- Partner with agencies and stakeholders in support of beneficial use of dredge materials.
- Continue outreach to elected officials through periodic communications and Washington, D.C. Advocacy trips for FY26 appropriations. 12 meetings held in March 2025 and four meetings on May 17, 2025.
- Continue engagement on waterway closures for non-waterway maintenance.
- Provide opportunities for engagement between stakeholders and decisionmakers through collaboration with partner organizations. Our 2025 Annual Meeting will be held from November 17-19, 2025 in Savannah, GA.
